

Please Co-sponsor Sen. Creem and Sen. Brownsberger's amendment to add \$2 million for Civil Legal Aid in FY18

The Senate Ways & Means Committee recommended level funding for the Massachusetts Legal Assistance Corporation (MLAC) at \$18 million in its FY18 budget. We appreciate the Ways and Means Committee's continued support of civil legal aid. However, due to overwhelming need for services, we will continue to advocate for additional funding.

Senators Creem and Brownsberger will file an amendment to increase the Senate Ways & Means recommendation by \$2 million, for a total appropriation of \$20 million for civil legal aid.

Low-income individuals and families depend on civil legal aid

- ☑ MLAC funds 14 programs that provide free legal advice and representation to tens of thousands of our state's poorest and most vulnerable residents. Civil legal aid provides critical support in cases related to housing, employment, family law, domestic violence, health care, education, immigration, protection of elders, and more.
- ☑ Massachusetts residents who live at or below 125% of the federal poverty level (\$30,750 a year for a family of four) are eligible for civil legal aid.
- ☑ Due to lack of funding, civil legal aid programs are forced to turn away **65% of eligible low-income residents** who seek services.

Civil legal aid: A wise investment to meet an urgent need

- ☑ Without civil legal aid, vulnerable Massachusetts residents, including families with young children, elders, and domestic violence survivors, are forced to face the complex legal system alone, with often devastating consequences on the health and welfare of individuals and communities.
- ☑ MLAC's Economic Benefits report found that **civil legal aid provided by MLAC-funded programs in fiscal year 2016 yielded at least \$49.3 million in savings or new revenue for the state and its residents.**
- ☑ With federal funding for civil legal aid and other safety net programs under threat, state investment in civil legal aid is more important than ever.
